Died on the 22/09/1915 of enteric fever and inflammation of the tonsils on the Hospital Ship , age 19 / DOB - 29/04/1896. Youngest son of Neil Thomson (1853 - 27/01/1919) and Mary Hogg Thomson (1859 - 29/07/1937) of 83e Woodside St, Coatbridge. 1 of Alexander's brothers was Private John Thomson (26916) of the 1st Battalion Highland Light Infantry who died also of enteric fever on the 17/07/1916. From the 1901 Census - Address - 150 Woodside St, Coatbridge - Neil Thomson aged 46, Mary Thomson aged 42, James Thomson aged 23 (1879 - 18/01/1934), Robert Thomson aged 20 (1880 - 22/11/1912), William Thomson aged 18, Neil Thomson aged 14 (1886 - 11/08/1906), Maggie Thomson aged 13 (1888 - 03/05/1918), Berburn Thomson aged 11, George Thomson aged 8, John Thomson aged 7 (15/03/1894 - 17/07/1916), Mary Thomson aged 6, Alexander Thomson aged 4 (29/04/1896 - 22/09/1915). Alexander and his brother John's Pensions were both awarded to their mother Mary. Employment was Miner in Rosehall Colliery with his father
